Abstract:

Early life course outcomes through the lens of structure and agency

The interplay of structure and agency from a life course perspective has recently garnered substantial scientific interest, particularly how it plays out in the early life course from childhood to young adulthood (Heckhausen & Buchmann, 2019). The intriguing question is what it takes that young people may grasp the opportunities and circumvent the constraints associated both with the institutional contexts and the position in the social structure. These questions are not only challenging from a theoretical point of view but are also demanding from a methodological perspective. The talk will address these challenges by offering several theory-informed empirical illustrations. These illustrations tap into the joint role of social relationships and individual agency for educational upward mobility chances of students from lower social background. They also address the co-development of agency components for educational attainment and ask about the developmental precursors of young adults' solidarity during the Covid-19 pandemic. These empirical illustrations are based on COCON data – a multi-cohort, multi-informant longitudinal study of children, youth, and young adults that is representative of the German- and French-speaking parts of Switzerland (Buchmann et al., 2021).

Prof. Dr. h.c. Marlis Buchmann, born in 1950, was appointed to the University of Zurich in 1994. She was also professor at the ETH until 2005. From 2004 to 2016, she was Managing Director of the Jacobs Center for Productive Youth Development, University of Zurich. She has been a visiting professor at Stanford University, UCLA, NYU, New School for Social Research, University of Bremen, WZB and Fellow at CASBS, Stanford. Her main research interests: Sociology of the life course, social stratification and mobility, educational, occupational and labor market sociology, social / cultural change. She is a member of the German Academy of Sciences Leopoldina.
