Criminological encounters (6 ECTS)

This course unit is part of the master of Urban Studies. This course discusses current themes, concepts and theories in criminology. It analyzes the complexities of defining, explaining, measuring and reacting to crime in a conversation with practitioners and scholars from different fields within criminology. What are the origins of crime? What makes a criminal? Poverty? Inequality? Mental disease? How to measure crime? How to research it? What groups and actions are criminalized? What are the main characteristics of offenders and victims in different types of crime? How to tackle crime? How to prevent it? How to punish it? These are some of the questions that will be discussed in this course. The course combine different teaching strategies including the preparation and presentation of seminars by students, the analysis of multimedia material, like movies and documentaries, combined with key readings on the topic and, most importantly, the encounters with practitioners and scholars in the field of criminology and on related areas who will be invited to share their experiences.

Students will be assessed on the basis of a group task (40%) activity and a final oral exam (60%) with written preparation. For the oral exam students will be allowed to bring and consult a summary of classes and texts prepared by themselves. For the group task students will prepare one seminar based on both the mandatory and supplementary texts for one of the course's sessions. Students are expected to deliver their slides and a written explanation of the intervention they plan to make in class.

Crime & The City (9 ECTS)

Crime and the city introduces students in the large domain of urban criminology. The main goal of the course is to discuss how space matters to criminology. Space influences citizens' lives, practices, experiences and emotions, at the same time that it is created and recreated on a daily basis by its inhabitants, commuters, users, and visitors. These processes will be studied in their relationship with crime, fear, disorder and urban conflicts. At a theoretical level, the profile builds on the subdomain of urban criminology, combining criminological, urban studies, social geographical theory and method. The first central theme of the course is fear. This concept will be critically discussed and decomposed in its different meanings and connections to the city, with particular attention to public space. Different aspects of fear will be treated: such as the relationship between fear and space; fear of the other (gender and ethnicity); labelling, representation, stigmatization of neighbourhoods; nightlife; the politics of

fear; and the relationships between fear and securitization. The second central topic of the course is order. This topic will be explored through a multiplicity of subthemes that include public order, incivilities, nuisances, crime prevention, conflicts in public spaces; urban securitization; surveillance and control of public spaces; protests and the right to the city; and a critical analysis of environmental criminology and situational crime prevention. The third central topic is qualitative urban criminology methodologies. Through practices like city walks and photography, students learn how to conduct observation in public spaces. Moreover, the students are supported and stimulated to explore alternative qualitative urban criminology methodologies.

Students will be assessed on the basis of an oral exam and a practical assignment.

Critical discourses on Policing, Surveillance, Penology and Youth Criminology (9 ECTS)

This course is designed to provide students with an understanding of critical perspectives on policing, surveillance, penology and youth criminology. By examining these areas through a critical lens, students will gain insights into the complexities and challenges surrounding law enforcement, criminal justice and youth justice systems.

The themes that will be discussed and analysed change on a yearly basis and can include the following topics:

- Police legitimacy
- Surveillance and technology
- Gender and youth crime and justice
- Detention of youngsters
- Victimology and restorative justice
- Experiences of punishment
- Immigration detention

An overview of the content of the lectures and seminars will be provided in the beginning of the semester. Each of the lectures is accompanied with texts and slides. The texts form the basic material for this course. Students will also have to make two assignments linked to the lectures and seminars.

Legal, Ethical and Social Issues of Artificial Intelligence (6 ECTS)

The students learn about the interdisciplinary dimensions and consequences of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and about the interaction between AI and society, in particular by going deeper into the legal, ethical and societal issues of AI. The course focuses on various case studies and research examples from the public and private sectors in Belgium but also internationally. The course requires active participation of the students. Participation consists of reading the required texts in advance of the lectures and online resources that are provided and active participation in discussions during the lectures.

Students will be assessed on the basis of a legal, ethical and social analysis of chosen case study and their defence of the paper at an oral exam.

Sustainability: an Interdisciplinary Approach (6 ECTS)

Major social challenges call for systemic changes. However, changing our diverse and complex society is difficult and the outcomes are unpredictable. The course consists of three tracks. In the first track 'theme sessions on sustainable development' present-day sustainability challenges are presented by experts from academia, government or society, each active in a different discipline or working transdisciplinary. These talks are followed by a discussion about the extent to which each field can support transitions towards a sustainable society, and from where inter- and transdisciplinary collaboration is required. The second track 'Empower sessions on working with wicked problems', the basic concepts and models for sustainable change in our diverse and complex world are explored. Through literature and observations, these sessions tackle the notion of complex adaptive systems, as well as transition management, including systems thinking. The third track is 'Group assignment, community engaged research and learning' The insights from the theme and empower sessions are completed by a practical experience. Interdisciplinary groups of students develop a pathway for transition of a novel innovation towards a sustainable future. Hereby students explore in depth the complexity, possibilities, challenges, and essential stakeholders of the system around that innovation.

Students will be assessed on the basis of a written exam and a practical assignment.
